## 6. Park Manager's Report

Andrea Pita reported on a range of issues:

#### **Southwark Park**

<u>Bowling Green – Artificial Rink</u> - no further work has been undertaken to date, due to the exceptionally cold weather.

<u>Bowling Green – Pavilion Roof</u> - we are currently awaiting feedback from Resa Mehmet – Repairs & Maintenance and Henderson regarding an example of where felt has been used elsewhere.

#### Tree Issues - Southwark Park

- The Arboricultural Officer has inspected the coronation tree and will be arranging for a couple of the stumps to be cut down to ground level, although they are very close to the railings and this will hinder the operation, as one of the stumps has actually grown over the railings. The tree will need to be replaced sometime in the future, as it is in decline.
- It appears the developer in the land of the former working man's club has cut back some overhanging tree branches, although there is no proof of this. Perhaps Corinne Turner could investigate this!
- The two missing young staked trees in the children's playground will be replaced in the 2013 planting season.

<u>Lake Pump</u> - we are currently awaiting feedback from Resa Mehmet – Repairs & Maintenance and Henderson regarding the electricians who are due to carry out a full investigation of the electrical problems.

<u>Community Wildlife Garden</u> - Georgia Villalobos - London Wildlife Trust has worked on a conservation project in the garden with a couple of groups on 13<sup>th</sup> / 14<sup>th</sup> February.

<u>Lake/Island Maintenance</u> - QSL have been reminded of their responsibility to remove litter from the lake on a daily basis. A site meeting has taken with Jon Best to view the perimeter island beds and a further meeting will now be arranged with a representative from TRUE (Trust for Urban Ecology) to discuss a number of options, the main emphasis being to cut out the Buddleia. However it was felt the willow branches overhanging the water near the viewing area by the Ada Salter Garden should remain in situ as they are beneficial to wildlife.

<u>Hawkstone Road Car Park</u> - a joint site inspection of the park took place with QSL on 31<sup>st</sup> January and a number of outstanding operations were identified, including the maintenance of the car park.

<u>Children's Playground</u> - the Repairs & Maintenance SWT (Small Works Team) have confirmed there are no current faults with the roundabout although there are loose rivets in the aluminium base plate of the sprung standing rocker in the corner and this has been recorded and is due to be repaired in the near future. It is not considered to be dangerous to use at present.

<u>Stakeholder Meetings</u> - the minutes of the previous meeting have been drafted, but they have yet to be circulated. The next meeting will be held in March and the date will be confirmed as soon as possible.

	<ul> <li>TFL have asked for a large overhanging limb of the silver birch to be cut back by Rotherhithe roundabout, as it is in danger of splitting and falling on to the road and fence.</li> <li>Three dead cherry trees are due to be felled and two medium diseased birch will also be felled in the near future.</li> <li>The Arboricultural Officer will be alerting the Planning department as there is a TPO in KSG.</li> </ul>

## 'I Love Jamaica Day' Event

Thank you very much for attending our Special Meeting on Monday, and also for arranging for the applicants for the above event to be present. We are pleased to be part of the consultation and feel it was a helpful meeting at which information was shared. We believe that our main matters of interest came over clearly, but to recap, for the event to be successful the questions we think the organisers and Southwark Council should address include:

### Infrastructure and capacity

- 1. Can the park accommodate such a potentially large event and are the right measures in place to ensure that there will not be any detrimental damage to the environment? A target audience of 13,000 is much larger than most Southwark Park events, so we would want to be convinced that all necessary services are in place to cater for them.
- 2. Particular attention needs to be paid to control of vehicles in the park; adherence to routing and load-bearing stipulations and the use of protective tracking.
- 3. Have the organisers a good record of event management and do they have sufficient resources to carry out post-event rectification if needed? What level of bond is being specified?

#### **Public Access**

- 4. Can the limitations on access to the park before and after the event be reviewed in order to maximise access for our park users? The suggested five days build-up and breakdown seems to us to be too long a period for people to be denied their regular access.
- 5. Can the organisers be clearer about which parts of the park will be available for use by those not attending the event? For instance, at present it appears from the plans that on the day of the event itself that people wishing to use the cafe, playground, art gallery and lake may have to pass through a security barrier? We suggest the organisers think through the logistics of separating paying and non-paying park users and redraw their event boundary line in order to avoid contention.

### Paid Event

6. Does the event have to a paid one? While we understand the need to plan for and control the number of visitors, this will be a major departure from a very long-held practice of events in Southwark Park where cost has not been a barrier to the community. We are concerned about the setting of a precedent which may price out families and those on low incomes. If the day is to be as inclusive as possible we would ask the organisers to review this issue.

### Income

7. While we support the aims of the organisers in raising funds for their chosen charities we ask that Southwark Park should also directly benefit from any income from the event. We have a range of suggestions of how money can be used to improve the park and would be happy to pass those on to the organisers and the Council.

### Security

8. The scale of the proposed event will inevitably require very good security. This applies not simply to the park itself, but also to its environs. We urge the organisers and Council to consult on a detailed security plan which meets the needs of park users and the community.

## Transport and Traffic

9. We appreciate the view of the organisers that public transport should be the main way of getting to the event, but experience over many years shows that cars will be used. We ask that a comprehensive traffic management plan for the day is produced and consulted upon so that the park neighbours lives, particularly those in Gomm Road and nearby estates, are not badly disrupted by the event.
